Through Russell's energetic and enthusiastic efforts, the San Jose Fire Department now has a

professional recruitment program that will be instrumental in shaping the Fire Department of tomorrow.

Since taking on this new position last year, his efforts have resulted in a grant from Adobe Systems of \$10,000 and a van specifically outfitted for recruiting. He located underutilized space at Fire Station 1 and transformed it into a recruitment office. He started an intern program with the Mission College Fire Science Program and founded a west coast consortium of Fire Department Recruiters called CREWS (Consolidated Recruitment Encompassing Western States), which includes LA City and County, San Diego, Portland, Seattle, San Francisco, and Sacramento.

He also initiated the founding of the local chapter of the Santa Clara County Black Firefighters Association in 1973.

Over the years, Russell has taken on any assignment with enthusiasm and has gone above and beyond what was asked of him. He has consistently used innovative approaches to complete his projects. A self-starter, he needs little or no supervision.
